I had the opportunity to meet Ram anna and Mohan anna during the farewell party we had arranged for Mohan anna. It was only my first week at SRM. I had already became a volunteer at TQI. MOHAMAD YUSUFF

Pursuing Masters

Year 2017 - Yusuf had just completed his schooling and was ready to take a break from the rat race. That was when he accompanied his sister to a rural school where she was teaching. "I was there once to see what she was doing, but ended up accompanying her every single time after that."

A year later, he joined college and connected with Ram Anna (Founder, TQI). He suggested that Yusuf start a team of his own in his college. In the beginning, his college wouldn't allow him to go on fieldwork so he had to bunk classes. Year went by until he was given the next project – Kanaa Chhote Scientist. "We were a team of four then. I am now coordinating online DIY Kanaa sessions for Thoothukudi district.

Yusuf had started his own social service for the virus outbreak before the government project. In February, he had pooled money from college to provide masks and gloves to the daily wage workers and college canteen employees. This came to the notice of the principal and the rest of the staff. From then on, he, along with friends, could supply the same until lockdown.

"Later in April, I was at home when I got this Government Covid Volunteering registration link. I immediately registered for the program and shared the same with Ram Anna and other TQI groups.

A couple of days later I received a call. I was asked to come over to the Taluk office to collect my ID and start the work. They put me up at a nearby PDS shop.

The first day was a little difficult for me. I had to talk to the people, make them maintain social distancing whilst explaining what this was all about. I had to multitask. Officers from the local police station used to drop in every now and then. They enquired about the issues we faced. After a few days, people from the locality also understood the process. They even brought lemonade and snacks for us. I was glad to have such a great support system through out the period – not to mention my family and their care."

"One day on my way to the venue I lost my ID card. I went all the way back to the taluk office to collect a new one. But to my surprise, on the same day, I got a call from a stranger, said he had got my ID card. I went to meet him and got my old ID back. He was also a volunteer like me. I was happy to meet such a kind and thoughtful person. This was one of the best memories during the project. Every small experience counts, every memory counts and so does every act of kindness even if it doesn't seem to be. I volunteered for a total of a hundred days. Met a lot of new people, saw what is out there in the places we don't notice on a normal day, learned a lot."

Other than Covid volunteering if I am to list some memories, the best would be the first feedback I got. I was at home reading it aloud and my father got tears in his eyes. I felt pure joy then. Got all the confidence to reinvent myself. That was a moment I would never forget in my life.

I always had the fire inside to help others, to hold the pier of change. I was clueless about how to start with it. But now, I have got TQI to hold my back and support me. The brand speaks for itself and I now have a safe space to open up to new ideas. It's been a blessing altogether. This is what I got to convey to everyone who will read this – TQI has your back. TQI will show you the way if you are brave enough to walk through and through.



ASHOTHARMA

Technical Assistant, TWAD

It was in 2017 when Ashotharma was in college that he came to know about Talent Quest for India through a few of his college mates. The idea of TQI fascinated him so much that, it took him very little time to fill the form and attend the brief interview. It all happened so quick. Ashotharma spent the first two years in TQI accompanying fellow volunteers to schools and orphanages in and around Tirunelveli. It was in the previous year that he took up mentoring.

"I went to a couple of schools during these years as part of the Ullas Summit program. Alphonsa School, Anbu Illam, Periyar Higher Secondary schools, are a few of them. My first ever experience with kids is still fresh in my memory. It was a class of ninth grade. I was scared since it was the first time I ever faced these many school kids at a time. The moment I entered the class, the students started shooting a million questions and all I could do was stand there still. I was petrified, to be honest!" said Ashotharma. He fondly remembers the first time he went to Anbu Illam as part of Ullas. "I was hanging out with the camera when another student asked me to get inside. He took my camera and wouldn't hear no for an answer. I was reluctant but went inside to saw an otherwise very strict senior of mine, dressed as a clown and dancing with the kids. That was the moment I realized, that the fear I had was all inside, and if I just let it all go for once, there won't be a looking back. So, I stepped up, forgot my fears and inhibitions, and started talking to those kids. I played games with them, spent time with them, taught them, and in return learned from them.

That was the day I gave my signature for the first time. My happiness had no bounds."

"Being with students younger than me taught me a lot of things that teachers never did. I realized that I had leadership qualities in me. My anger management got way better than before. But, most importantly, I learned how to face a crowd and interact. I understood the tricks of talking – what to talk, where to talk, and how to talk. Along with these big lessons, working with TQI also taught me certain smaller things like grooming! These three years had been an overall learning experience."

Tamil Nadu government, at the beginning of Covid – 19, had issued circular inviting young volunteers all around the state to help and assist other officers on the ground. Ashotharma applied for the program in the Thoothukudi district and worked with the state government for almost 150 days. He was scheduled at a PDS outlet in the Ettayapuram village, Thoothukudi.

"On the first day, it was all messy and new to me. A police constable came over and helped me manage the crowd and shared with me a few trivia about how to manage these people for the days to come. In the evening, he came over again and thanked me. He said that he could finally hit the road and do his assigned duty now that I was handling this area of the job. It was an eye-opener and a motivation for me. I could see the struggle that our police department was going through at these difficult times.

"On the second day, there was a huge crowd as usual, which was completely challenging for me to manage and there were instances where I shouted out for which I felt bad later. There was a man standing in a line there, who started asking about the salary we get for this volunteering. Though I explained to him about volunteering, he was convinced only when I showed photos of TQI activities from my mobile.

Then there was an announcement from the government to give ration supplies directly to the people's homes and it added more difficulties to the work and in addition to that, my family was not okay with me going in person to all the homes as it would make me vulnerable to the virus. But, I convinced them.

In another Village, people from abroad had come without giving any prior information to the government and one among them was tested positive, which eventually increased the spread of the virus in that village. People started protesting that they can't stay in the village anymore and to manage those issues, volunteers were assigned to that village, and I was one of them.

Meanwhile, people coming in from foreign countries to that area increased and they asked us to check every house in person and make sure that all the medical procedures were completed without fault. Then, we were appointed in a red alert zone, where we took tablets twice a day as a precaution and I had skin allergies because of the hand gloves.

Around the same time, we planned for an event called Friend - o - Meter for TQI. I got sick, was asked to stay home for three days, and I used that time to plan for that event.

When the spread of the virus started from the Koyambedu cluster, the cases started increasing in our area too. At that time, a single house was assigned to one volunteer. We were given many contact numbers of people affected by COVID to check their health status through call as well as in person. I was later assigned to 3 villages, where we issued masks to all the people but the problem was that they would not accept masks from us since they were afraid of getting in contact with the virus through us. It was sad to realize the low range of information they had about the virus. We, hence, had to make them aware of the pandemic. It was indeed very challenging.

Around my 140th day of COVID Volunteering, I felt left out from my family. I stayed with my father for a week and then returned back to volunteering. I volunteered for a total of 148 days and learned a lot from people. It was a very eye-opening experience."

Ashotharma is also a part of TQI'S Phone mentoring, which he describes as the best experience as it is giving him a platform to learn new things.



NIRMAL SHANKAR

Associate Director, Film Industry

A small interview with Mr. Nirmal Shankar Mr. Madhusudhan, Co-Founder of TQI Introduced Mr. Nirmal, a member of TQI for 3 years, who is consistently participating in all the TQI events and the core team member of TQI.

Madhu asked about Nirmal's entry and responsibility in TQI.

He said, i am an IT Employee in Chennai. I was a naughty kid during the school days. No one was there to teach me the right things. In 12th grade, at a certain point, i realized my mistakes. Then I joined my higher studies, on that time, though i didn't have any idea to correct the mistakes of others, i wanted to do something. At that point, my roommate said that he was going to the government schools to teach those children, then I came to know about TQI. I thought i could use this opportunity to make those children realize that there is a bigger world outside because those children used to live in a smaller circle. TQI provided me the platform to do that. Initially I was the member of Salem district. I'm from Namakkal district. In Success meet of TQI in Chennai they give an opportunity to initiate the events in my own district. So, I created a team in Namakkal District and i became a Mentor for that team and we started doing our best and now our juniors were doing better than us, and this is how our journey started.

Then Mr. Madhusudhan asked about the impact TQI made in his corporate life.

He said, everybody knows that there will be a big interview process where they will check all our skills and attitudes. In the interview, the key skill I mentioned was my membership in TQI, I told the panel about my journey in TQI from a member to a mentor. At that point, they came to know about my Leadership skills, as I handled more than 40 school kids. After 6 months in the office, they promoted me as an assistant team leader, when I asked about the reason for promoting a fresher as an Assistant team leader, they mentioned about my role in TQI as a mentor of a whole district. Wherever I go, after introducing myself, I would mention my presence in TQI because I always feel proud to the part of TQI.

Mr. Madhusudhan asked about the most memorable moment in TQI.

He said, what we consider as success would be our memorable moment. We are all leaders here and leaders should make leaders and it's my wish too. When I was teaching in grade 10, a boy came and dropped a letter in my hand. To my surprise, he wrote that I am his role model. I believe, to consider someone as our role model, we should not

look at their position, instead, we should look at their journey. That boy said that he was inspired when I shared my story and that was my best TQI moment. This motivated me to put more effort into my works.

Mr. Madhusudhan said that Mr. Nirmal's story best sums up that naughty kids don't turn up into naughty adults rather, turn into role models who impacts other people's lives.

Jeevithra from Dharmapuri sharing her story as part of TQI – the roads she took, people she met, and the memories of her leaving a mark in the lives of many. She is currently a member of the core committee and is also mentoring college students.

Every girl becomes a queen when she comes out of her boundary and starts planting the seeds of knowledge and Jeevithra is the one who came up to enlighten the young minds of Dharmapuri. She came to know about TQI through one of her seniors in the social club of her college. She began her journey as a volunteer in the year 2013. A small interview with Ms. Madhubala, Moderated by Mr. Madhusudanan, Co-founder, TQI

To begin with, he asked Ms. Madhubala about her experience in TQI. She said, "I'm working in the corporate sector. As I took a break from TQI to concentrate on my work, I joined again after 1 year and decided to volunteer on my weekdays. At that time there was a notification for the interview of DWO, So I decided to walk in. To my surprise, it was a 3-hour interview with Mr.Mohan, Mr.Ram, Mr.Vishwa & Mr.Madhusudhan as Panel members and I was amazed by the questioning skills of Mr.Madhusudhan. As there is a long interview, I lost my hope of getting selected but in the Alumni meet of 2017, they announced the DWOs and I was selected as the DWO of KARUR. I was very happy but fearful at the same time because I know its a big responsibility. So I Promised myself to concentrate, on this apart from my work pressures & to take this as a serious responsibility"

"As I have a very enthusiastic team, they took care of all the summits. Our team managed the summits without any delays. This reduced the need for my presence for the events to happen. I managed the teams through phone calls and get instant reports. I also made a suggestion to the Founders regarding the PG scholarship and they told me that they will implement the idea".

Then Mr. Madhusudhan asked about the impact TQI made in her corporate life. She said,

TQI helped me a lot to improve my skill to work in teams. I could also make friends easily and do the works properly. People around me also believed that I could manage teams easily, though I'm not in any positions like TL. The same happened with our TQI team. We worked with sync, we didn't fight within us in delegating the works. In case of a problem, we faced it together.

Mr. Madhusudhan thanked her for sharing her experiences and added that these words would encourage TQI to strive forward.

Ms. Madhubala is now one of the members of the TQI core team. She has devoted her valuable time to the growth of our family, as well as setting an example to other budding volunteers.



SUDHARSHAN

Senior Engineer, Infosys Ltd Mysore

With the flaming enthusiasm and a spirit of joy, TQI's Karur Volunteer, now a project manager of TQI ULLAS, shared the most precious experiences he had with TQI.

In February 2018, when his College senior called him for handling sessions for government school students, Mr Sudharshan didn't know anything about TQI, but the rest changed his life. As a first session, he went to a school at a remote village called Paramatthi, to handle classes for 9th-grade students.

"The students there had different perspectives and they took us to another world," he said.

"When my seniors, who took me into TQI, passed out of the college, I represented our district in ULLAS confluence held in 2018, and that is when I came to know about the core values and various other activities of TQI and when I met the teams from different districts in the summit, I was amazed and realised that the things I am doing are just a drop of the ocean", he said. In the next year, Mr Sudharshan was the mentor of the Karur district, he created a team, and made a clear plan for the events to facilitate out of the box thinking to the government school students. He always used to think about the gap that exists between the students of the government schools and the other schools and wanted to make a change.

"I want to be the change I wish to see in the world and that was made possible by the ULLAS sessions", he said.

With the team's persistent efforts, they gained a good name from the principal of the college, who then supported them for all the activities.

"TQI helped me a lot in improving my managerial skills. I learned to manage multiple things with a great balance and also to approach a higher authority, which I never knew before. Moreover, the module for Ullas per se is life-oriented and helped me in many endeavours" he said.

In a diary and a planner given for the students, a student asked for his autograph, which Mr Sudharshan proudly shared, which also reminded him of Mr Ram's favourite quote, "Success is when your signature changes into Autograph".

"When we went to the Paramathi school after 3 months, children there, with all the enthusiasm, reached us and shared their progress after our Ullas sessions. The thing that they remembered us after 3months itself made us overwhelmed and took us to cloud nine", he said. In his journey Mr Sudharshan planned many events like DAAN UTSAV, One year, one cause, Farmer's day and a lot more and among them Farmers day celebration, where they worked in the field with the farmers and gave them cards and events conducted in an orphanage for physically disabled children, stays close to his heart.

During the next Confluence, his team got the Best Team award for their well-planned events and on-time submission of reports which encouraged the team further.

"I developed my mail writing skills during this time, which is helping me now in my business. After TQI, life changed a lot. From an average student to the one with good managerial skills, I started balancing everything in my life and learnt to handle things professionally. To be short, TQI shaped the best out of me. Now, from handling one team in Karur to handling 28 teams in ULLAS, I learned a lot from TQI and hoping to give back a lot to TQI", he said.

Don't expect a change, be the change, says Mr Sudharshan, as a message to all TQI'ians.

Yeshwanth, a proud TQIian, started as a volunteer in 2016 and now a project manager, shared his experience on how his passion for social work came true. Yeshwanth worked with small projects in TQI during his first year of college. As a person interested in doing business and making short films, he took a year break and again joined TQI in 2017.

When he met Mr. Gokul (Project head, TQI), and expressed his interest in doing more projects in TQI, he was asked to approach Ram anna and then handled the Daan Utsav project of TQI. After getting appreciation from Ram anna for the effort he took on the Daan Utsav project, he was asked to apply for Zonal head in TQI, which is meant for final year students. He attended the interview but was not selected for the role. But life is all about miracles and surprises.

A few days later, Yeshwanth got a call from Ram Anna, along with all the top tier members of TQI. He was asked to work as a Project manager in the expansion team!

"As a project manager in TQI, I have to talk with many corporate people. Talking with strangers was something I was afraid of, but this role and TQI changed everything. It gave me the confidence to give a speech in front of 1000+ people in my college. In fact, it is because of that experience in TQI, that I am now able to work efficiently in the corporate field.

"Initially, When I tried to join some organisations for social work, things were so tough. I was never satisfied with the work I did. But in TQI, I'm getting the fullest support and doing my best for society."

He regrets that he had a year break from TQI. At present, Yeshwanth is also coordinating the TQI Express phone mentoring for college students.

"There is nothing called an 'end' or 'fullest of experience' in any field, there is always something waiting in the next step" is the lesson from TQI that he had learnt.

"Don't hesitate to talk/approach people when there is a need, to accomplish something. You should seek help whenever it's essential. There is nothing to be ashamed of. It is the moment when I blew my hesitations and spoke to Ram Anna, that changed my life for the better."



ANUSUYA KARUPPAIYA

Software developer at Sprintzeal Private Limited

Anusuya, who has been working in the Namakkal team since her college days, shared her journey which started when she got to know about TQI from her college senior. As a person who is interested in teaching, Anusuya began her journey in the Salem team with a dream to form a team of girls.

Anusuya's thoughts of gender empowerment manifested into a girls team of volunteers in Namakkal, which she is holding close to her heart. 'I always wanted to create opportunities for women to come out and do something, but I was clueless and TQI gave me the biggest opportunity to make things I dreamt of into reality', says Anusuya.

When She opted for the Namakkal team, she formed a team of the girls and started working. As a person from a government school, she wanted to be an inspiration for the students in government schools and she became one, when she started handling sessions in the schools.

After forming the team, she struggled a lot to get a school to conduct sessions. She approached more than 4 schools to get permission. But when they got the permission, it's time to prove themselves! Kids are so active and naughty in the classroom.

Teachers wanted to stand with us when we are handling the sessions, to control the students and are always doubtful of us but we convinced them to leave for a while and created an environment where all of them could listen.

When teachers got the feedbacks about us from the kids, they called us again, asked us to come again for the session and that's really a proud moment for our team. Getting feedback from the school students after the session is always special.

When I talked about being fearless and the importance of coming up to talk before the crowd, a kid from that class wrote that I'm her inspiration. Those are the moments to cherish', says Anusuya. She was the KANAA project manager in 2020 and also a part of the Module preparation team for phone mentoring. She said, 'KANAA project made me realize my strengths'.

TQI is a turning point in Anusuya's life. "From project management to communication skills, TQI shaped me into a different person and all that I learnt in TQI, I'm executing it in my career", says Anusuya.

She said, 'When we are very determined to do something, nothing can stop us. With strong efforts and hard work, success will be the only result'.

Aravinth, one of TQI's core members who has remained with the organisation since its beginning, has shared a lot about his journey with TQI and everything he has learned along the way. He starts, "The journey began in 2011 when I first met Ram. When Ram, Madhu, Vel, Kamal, myself, and a few others decided to conduct an express mentoring programe, That was the place where the base of phone mentoring and a few other events were discussed.I was associated with few of my juniors to organize some communication classes", and continues to cheerfully share them all. 


